3. Approved request leads to check

Executive Director approves the request and mails or wires a check from Society Headquarters. It is possible that the Executive Director will ask for additional information to determine whether the loss was due to natural causes.

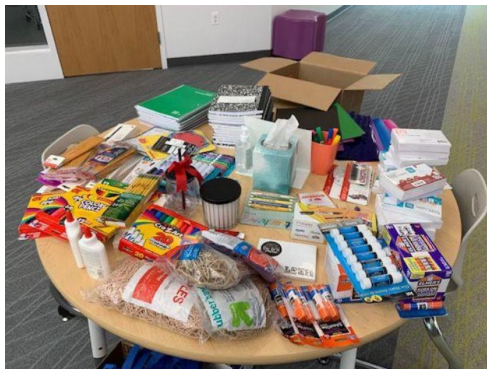
Lastly, we are looking to award a scholarship to a deserving senior of a local high school that is entering the field of education. This scholarship will be presented at the May meeting.

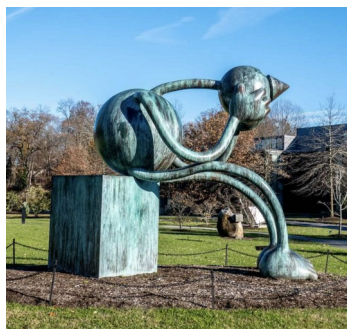
Delta Chapter kicked off our 2022-2023 events with a visit to the Delaware Art



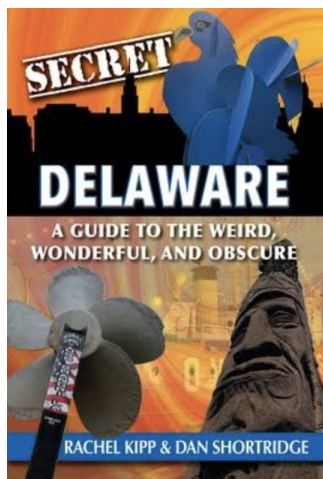

and R&B music, delicious food, and the talented dancers from the First State Ballet Theatre.

The Delaware Art Museum also features the Copeland Sculpture Garden. The garden has a 10-foot tall sculpture



called the *Crying Giant*, which was designed as a model for a memorial to the victims of September 11.



Our September and October meetings had a crossover. October's guest speaker was Rachel Kipp, one of the authors of Secret Delaware: A Guide to the Weird, Wonderful, and Obscure. Rachel

referred to the *Crying Giant* in the introduction of her book. She also discussed Howard Pyle, a native of Wilmington, who is well-known for his illustrations of pirates. Rachel's presentation was quite interesting and informative.

Other sites featured in the book are:

A fiberglass replica of an 840-pound Mako shark caught off the coast of Delaware over 30 years ago and displayed in front of a fishing supply store in Odesa

The Fountain of Youth in Lewes; legend has it that the fountain was discovered by the area's first Dutch colonists in 1631

The John Dickinson Plantation in Dover; Dickinson is known as the "Penman of the Revolution" for eloquently arguing the cause of American liberty

The Cannonball House in Lewes, which was scarred by cannon fire during the War of 1812; that same cannonball remains lodged in its side today

Delta Chapter recently donated \$300 to the Friendship House for the purchase of school uniforms for Wilmington students in need.

In November, we will be taking a tour of the Food Bank of Delaware in Newark and donating food for Thanksgiving baskets.

We will meet for dinner and visit Winterthur or Hagley Museum in December for holiday festivities.

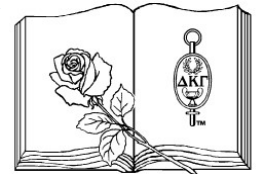
