
On March 2, member Carol Stead is going to teach us how to make Pysanky Eggs. She showed us how to a few years ago, and we requested an encore!






Proposals to Amend DKG DSO Bylaws 2023

9. Nominations Committee retitled Nominating Committee
Final proposals are approved by the state Rules Committee.

21. Expansion duties are delegated to Membership Committee
22. Directory to be published annually in September


